Dear Church Family,

Identity is a major theme of our lives. It concerns everything from how we look to our careers or lifestyle. It can also refer to groups we associate with, from political parties to sports teams, ideologies and beyond. As Christians, our primary identity is that we belong to God through our Savior, Jesus Christ. This core way of understanding who we are and what we belong to informs our other subidentities.

A unique feature of our faith is that it is a communal religion. We can pray, worship, read scripture and do good works in Jesus' name individually, but these are never meant to be done in isolation. Throughout our sermon series in September, we were reminded that we serve as part of the body of Christ -- made of individual parts that work together, none more important than another -- being Jesus' hands and feet in the world. The pandemic has made it challenging to keep all the parts of the body together, and we hope that some new things in the life of Clen-Moore will help draw us back together.

Our friends from Shenango Presbyterian Church will be joining us for worship and fellowship as we celebrate the Lord's Supper with Christians throughout the world for World Communion Sunday. In 1 Corinthians Paul writes, "There are many members, yet one body". But do not take our word for it—read 1 Corinthians 12:12-31 for yourself and see what God has to say about the life we share together in Jesus Christ.

Mission Spotlight!



October—Crisis Shelter

On the occasion of its 40th Anniversary, the Crisis Shelter of Lawrence County announced it has a new name. It is now called Arise, accompanied by the tagline "Our Community's Response to Violence and Abuse." President LeeAnn Fulena explained that the non-profit wanted a name that encompassed the entirety of its services which does much more than provide a roof over one's head. They help victims of human trafficking, victims of rape and many other forms of emotional crisis to women, children and, yes, even to men. Their services also include educational programs designed to raise awareness, prevent violence/abuse, and train individuals how to intervene.

Arise was founded in 1981 as the Women's Shelter. It transitioned to the Women's Shelter/Rape Crisis Center in 1988 and the Crisis Shelter of Lawrence County in 2003 after the completion of their new facility on West State Street. The new facility allowed the agency to consolidate its comprehensive services under one roof. An estimated 1500 victims/ survivors are serviced each year and more than 6000 participate in prevention education and training. All services are free to greater Lawrence County residents regardless of gender, race, age, sexual orientation, income level or disability.

Arise believes one of the most powerful solutions to ending the generational cycle of violence is the agency's transitional housing program, where families have adequate time to learn the skills of independence. It is perhaps here that members of Clen-Moore may be called to contribute items that these families desperately need. They currently include boys clothes (sizes 6-18), cooking supplies (can openers, mixing bowls, microwave meals); laundry supplies; and cleaning supplies. While cash contributions are also welcome, Executive Director, Debbie Hennon, said that most of these families are in need of prayer and opportunities to become a part of the community through social activities and gatherings.

"Individuals need to do more than open their wallets to help address violence and crime in our community," says Hennon. "They need to open their hearts too." Volunteer opportunities may be found at https://www.crisisshelter.org/volunteer/.
